OFFICERS:

President: J. Yuhanna Edwards has served on the Board of UNA-Westchester for several years, as President and Advocacy Chair. He has served as a member of the Mount Vernon City Council and has held other city government posts, including Commissioner of Parks and Recreation and director of Civil Defense and Emergency Services. He is also a New York State licensed insurance consultant. As a combat paramedic in the Vietnam War, Mr. Edwards received a gunshot wound and was honorably discharged in 1968. In addition to the Purple Heart, Bronze Star, and Distinguished Service Military Awards, Mr. Edwards has received numerous awards for his dedication to youth and senior citizens and outstanding community service. He holds several leadership positions, board appointments, and organization memberships, including Omega Psi Phi's Omicron Iota Chapter. Mr. Edwards is a graduate of Mercy College. He has recently lost his wife Roslyn of 52 years and has three children and five grandchildren.



First Vice President: Marcia M. Brewster served as president of UNA-Westchester for seven years from 2011-2018 and was elected to the UNA-USA National Council in 2018. She worked for the UN for over 30 years, both in New York and at the regional UN office for Asia and the Pacific, based in Bangkok, Thailand. She devoted most of her career to United Nations programs related to water, sustainable development and gender. Until 2006 she was Senior Officer for water resources in the Sustainable Development Division at United Nations headquarters in New York. She served as Manager of the UN's Interagency Task Force on Gender and Water and is deeply concerned about gender equality and women's empowerment. She is currently a senior consultant with Nautilus International Development Consulting in New York, and has recently undertaken assignments with the Village of Haverstraw, the United Nations Development Program, the Nature Conservancy, the World Water Council and the Global Environment Facility. She has an MSc from Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service and spent 13 years living and working in Asia. She lives in Hastings on Hudson and has twin sons.

Second Vice President: Lilli Schindler has worked for the United Nations in the Department of Public Information (now the Department for Global Communications, DGC) for the past 27 years. She has participated for many years in the Dialogue Project (New York), which engages diverse people in transformative dialogue related to the Middle East. For over ten years she was a Board member of the Center for Jewish-Christian-Muslim

Tricia Baldes is a middle level educator with two decades of experience working in public schools in New York. Her commitment to social action and peace education was nurtured while working in Somers Central School District, where a human rights education initiative was being pioneered. With colleagues, Tricia developed a comprehensive social action classroom curriculum for their 8th graders which served as the inspiration and the basis for Rock Your World. She continues to serve as Rock Your World’s chief program advisor. Tricia’s work with Rock Your World has grown over the years, allowing her to collaborate with

various organizations such as the Robert F. Kennedy Center for Justice and Human Rights, Rebelhouse Films, and Speranza Foundation. Tricia earned her bachelor's degree in English from Purchase College and a master's degree in English from Lehman College. She has led multiple professional development courses and has presented at national conferences. She continues to teach eighth grade English in Somers NY—each year inspiring a new group of students to become global citizens.

Dan Bena is an award-winning executive who served as PepsiCo's Corporate Water Steward and led the Sustainable Development agenda for PepsiCo Global Operations. Among others, he serves/has served on the Public Health Committee of the Safe Water Network; the Leadership Group of the World Business Council for Sustainable Development (WBCSD); Steering Board of IFC's 2030 Water Resources Group and Steering Committee of the United Nations CEO Water Mandate. Nicole Grieco Butterfield is Co-Chair of UNA-Westchester's Program Committee. She is a writer, educator and healthy relationships advocate based in Westchester County, New York. A graduate of Wesleyan University, Sarah Lawrence College and Middlebury College, she has worked with and on behalf of youth for over 30 years. Raina Kadavil currently serves as Communications Director and Young Professionals Co-Chair at UNA-Westchester. She is a dedicated lover of service work, writing and travel. She is a Marketing Analyst at

She is Philanthropy Chair of the Women’s Leadership Network at Mastercard and Chief Executive Officer of Urban Refuge, a nonprofit that maps aid for refugees and immigrants.
